on May 29, 1999 as the third civilian governor of the state. In the past, the health care projects of the immediate administration which added to the ones under the new government to make the award, would

have been abandoned and money spent on it going down the drains.

From the little we have seen in the first 100 days of Governor Ahmed, one could come to conclusion that continuity must encouraged by all state governments and the Kwara model should be emulated. It is through system developments can move fast and reach the nooks and crannies of the state without delay. Those who hate the idea call it stooge but progressives see it as a continuity agenda which is a novel experience in Kwara State.
